From Fendi to Gucci, she loved her designer handbags but as much as she treated herself good she also treated those around her the same way. Whether that meant driving you where you needed to go or doing what she could, she was there physically and emotionally with a comforting word or real advice with an honest and open opinion.

With an iPhone in one hand and her designer bag in the other, Melodye would tell you proudly and honestly, "I grew up in Brooklyn and I don't play that." She loved listening to Brian McKnight and Jaheim, playing her games on the computer, as well as spending time with her family, her husband who she affectionately called Cheb, and friends. Melodye was a survivor who never allowed an obstacle to defeat her spirit and tenacity. Even after a cancer diagnosis and a two-year battle with the disease, she overcame the odds to beat it with her motto, "God has a plan for me." She was a proud church member of Abundant Life.

On May 8, 2011, Ruth Melodye Jackson-Williams was called home to be with her heavenly father and is survived by a legacy of love including her husband, Cedric Williams; one son, Sean; her mother, Rosetta Jackson; two step-children, Cedric Williams Jr. and Cedrina Eyrb; one sister, Marcy; two nieces, Tiara and Tylah; one nephew, Anthony; two uncles, James and David Laury; mother-in-law, Vassie Williams; one godsister, Lynette Laury-Page; one godbrother, Mark Laury; three sisters-in-law, Patricia Williams, Iris Kelley, and Gwen Falero; and three brothers-in-law, Ronald and Raymond Williams, and Wilbert Baker, and a host of extended family and friends.
