

Obituary

Born **James Marion Washington**, son of David and Elizabeth Washington, **Abdul Mughnee Hasan** was born April 5, 1938 in Mount Pleasant, South Carolina. As the seventh child of David and Elizabeth. Hasan was a loving brother to his two brothers and four sisters. After a lengthy illness, his soul was called to Allah on Thursday, September 22, 2011.

In 1957, Hasan joined the army where he served as a paratrooper and repairman. After completing his four years of service, he was honorably discharged and he returned home to his family in Mt. Pleasant. Seeking to make a life for himself, he eventually migrated north to New York.

Hasan held various jobs in New York but pursued what he loved most which was styling women's hair and barbering. In 1968, he met his wife, Khalilah Musheerah Hasan, when he became her stylist. After a short courtship, they were married and the family settled in the Bronx

Hasan has always been a loving, spiritual man. But in 1970, after hearing lectures at Temple #7 which is now Malcolm Shabazz Masjid, he accepted Islam as his religion. Truly embracing the Islamic way of life, Hasan led his family into legally taking Islamic names.

After working for years as a barber and stylist at Shalamar Barber Salon in Harlem, the brothers Shamisdeen and Minister Louis Farrakhan opened Shabazz Barber Salon under the Masjid on West 116th Street and Lenox Avenue and personally chose Hasan first as a manager and eventually as the sole owner. Abdul Mughnee Hasan successfully turned Shabazz Barber Salon into a profitable business and community landmark where he worked for over thirty years. He often would cut senior citizens and others for free. He even trained men recently released from prison how to cut hair which helped many to re-enter society with a skill and a job. Because of his close mentoring of the stylists, Shabazz Barber Salon became known far and wide as the premier barber salon of Harlem. Hasan had many celebrity clients such as Duke Ellington, Muhammad Ali, Sugar Ray Robinson, James Brown, Redd Foxx and a host of others. But to Hasan, the true stars were the people in the community, especially the children who he always took time to talk to and teach important lessons in life.

Abdul Mughnee Hasan loved life, loved his family and loved Allah above all. With his son, Abdul Karim Hasan, by his side, he mentored Karim into becoming a skilled barber and businessman. When Hasan fell ill, his son, Karim stepped in and took over the business. Under Karim's control, Shabazz Barber Salon continues today in tribute to the legacy of Hasan.

Abdul Mughnee Hasan was preceded in death by his mother and father, David and Elizabeth, his brother, David Washington and his sister, Ethel Wright. He is survived by: his loving wife and friend, Khalilah Musheerah Hasan; sons, Fard Hasan, Abdul Karim Hasan, Pasha Hasan and Anthony Holmes; his daughter, Regina Holmes; his sisters, Rosa Lee Coasum, Alma Washington and Leola Wright; his brother, Fred Washington; eleven grandchildren; eight great-grandchildren; and a host of loving relatives and friends.

His last wish was for his family to know that he loved them all dearly. To Allah we belong and to Him we return.
