All of the various positions William held, his most fulfilling and dedication of the love he had for people was working as a special education teacher. He worked in various school districts, as a substitute teacher for many years to finally secure a position for Elizabeth permanent Public School system at Thomas Edison Career and Technical School. He worked for fourteen years and eight months.

Mr. Zimmerman affectionately known by his colleagues, peers and students as "Mr. Z". William was a teacher to his students who made a difference in their lives by concerning himself with not only their academic ability but their personal lives. William made sure that his students were given everyday equal opportunities to learn in any educational environment. William knew the obstacles many of his students were challenged with that is why he taught subject matter but he also gave sound advice to allow his students to progress with the most available tools (educational) that were given by him in order to empower his students. His goal mission and zeal for life was attainable because "Mr. Z" always kept life simple, practical and fair.

His love of family, education and serving others will always be kept close to our hearts. His hobbies were bowling, music, good food and African American Studies.
