

The Obituary

Cheryl Singleton was born in Harlem on May 22, 1949, the eldest of three children of James and Julia McKinny Walker. Cheryl's mother Julia died when she was eleven years old and Cheryl was raised by her father and paternal grandmother, Lillian Walker. Cheryl's brothers James and Barry predeceased her over thirty years ago under traumatic circumstances. Soon after her mother's death, Cheryl was diagnosed with schizophrenia and its inherent problems plagued her for the rest of her life.

Cheryl was educated in the New York Public School System and graduated from Evander Childs High School in the Bronx. **Cheryl** and her cousin Linda grew up together. As teenagers they were inseparable and enjoyed sharing activities with each other. **Cheryl** and Linda were confirmants together at All Souls Church in Harlem.

Cheryl married Joseph Singleton and moved to Springfield, Massachusetts where she worked as an office worker in an insurance company. While Joseph was a student at Springfield College, Cheryl struggled to make a success of her marriage but after three years, Joseph had problems with law enforcement. Consequently, Cheryl's uncle Richard and Aunt Avis brought her back to New York. She soon divorced Joseph and attempted to move on with her life.

In 1992, **Cheryl** moved to Detroit to live with her aunt Katherine Ward with the hope that the change was a good move. For approximately fifteen years, **Cheryl** did live somewhat a normal life. She attended church with her aunt and worked in the church soup kitchen serving the needy in the community. When **Cheryl's** aunt and her aunts' two sons, Richard and Anthony died, **Cheryl** returned to New York City. Periodically, **Cheryl** lived with aunt Avis and her cousin Linda, but the disease was increasingly taking its toll on her. In 2010, **Cheryl** was relocated to an apartment in Ana's House that was run by Catholic Charities. Cheryl loved her little apartment and took great pride and joy decorating it. She believed her luck was finally changing and we shared in her happiness. Unfortunately, **Cheryl's** happiness was short lived because she was diagnosed with cancer.

Cheryl has faced many challenges including lack of permanent housing, poor finances, and illness. **Cheryl** never questioned why her life was so difficult. Her attitude and personality was positive and she appreciated any act of kindness, however big or small, that most people take for granted.

Cheryl had a beauty of spirit and she and an infectious laugh that when she laughed she made us all laugh with her. **Cheryl** loved her family and enjoyed family gatherings at Linda's home. We will cherish the memory of the good times we shared with her.

Cheryl will be lovingly remembered by Aunt Avis McKenny; cousins, Linda and Aldo Smith, Caitlin Smith, Tevornique' McKenny; cousins, Joan and Tom Lynch who reside in Florida; Extended family, Aunt Margaret Mullings and cousins, Michael Mullings, Michelle and Billy Wright Mullings. **Cheryl's** family was small in number, but our love for her was limitless. We pray that **Cheryl** will find everlasting peace and joy in Heaven that was so elusive to her on earth.
