It was truly remarkable how for five generations of children she remembered to send a card for every birthday and attended every holiday. Proudly sat front row for every graduation, dance recital or special occasion. Her ninety-seven years of wisdom were a true testament of her faithfulness and devotion in life; touching many lives throughout her lifetime. Celia lived independently in Harlem being a blessing to her neighbors and community, until she became ill on October 20, 2012. Celia loved the Lord and he was the center of her blessings and joy. She thanked him daily for her life and family; quoting that her name is located several times in Kings chapter 23. The name Celia of Latin origin meaning heaven.

On November 23, 2012, God said "Celia, job well done", and called one of his angels home.
