Camille Lorraine Johnson was born August 28, 1927, to Camilla Jones and Johnson, in New Orleans. Camilla died when Camille was a small child. Camille was passed from family member to family member. Ultimately, Tuberculosis wiped her entire family out, by the time she was five. She grew up in a foster home for children, in Amityville, Long Island.

In her teen years, Camille met a Mexican laborer, named Teodoro Galvin Lopez, who swept her off her feet. In 1945, this union brought forth Gene Douglas Lopez, Camille's only child. After Teodoro's return to Mexico, Camille struggled to give her son the best upbringing she could. In the early 1950's Camille met George Brock and they were wed. Camille took great pride in the fact that her husband was one of the original black Bombardeers. Camille and George parted ways, however, he remained a father to Gene (the son he lovingly referred to as "little pot").

Belief

Although Camille was brought up in the Christian belief, in her 60's, she became a practicing Buddhist. Although Camille vacillated in her religious practice, she certainly acknowledged and believed there was a power higher than she.

Education/Work

Camille held many jobs in her lifetime, from domestic work to secretarial positions. She was a secretary for the Kingsbridge Veteran's Administration but chose to leave this position after being informed that as a "colored" girl she would never advance. It was at that time that she recognized the importance of an education and pursued a Bachelor's degree in Secretarial Studies from Pace University in Manhattan, NY. After obtaining her degree, she became a substitute teacher for the NYC Board of Education, teaching secretarial studies. Camille went to school at night and got a Master's Degree in CRMD, which allowed her to work with mentally challenged children. Camille was promoted to a full time position and worked her way up to becoming a special education/mainstream guidance counselor. Camille got a second Master's Degree while on sabbatical in Puerto Rico. After forty years of holding a position with the Board of Ed, Camille retired, at the age of seventy-two.

Passions

Camille created a new way of Shorthand and published a book on the subject. Her decoupage art work was featured in multiple "One Woman" shows. Camille was a model for Ophelia DeVore Charm School. Camille is listed in the Guiness Book of World Records, as part of the Tapping Seniors. She was part of the movement for the advancement of people of color and attended many marches, including the March on Washington. Camille enjoyed trips to the casinos. Her greatest love was travel. Camille has been to many countries, including (but not limited to) Europe, Japan, China, Africa, Egypt and the Middle East. Camille spent several months of each year in Puerto Rico, her second home.

New Beginnings

On January 31, 2014, at 3:00 p.m., Camille transitioned from this earthly plane, to her new beginning. She leaves behind to cherish her memories, her brother-in-law, Thomas Brock, her son, Gene Douglas Lopez, Sr. and loving daughter-in-law, Elizabeth Ann Lopez, her grandchildren, Gene D. Lopez, Jr., David T. Lopez, Jean-Simone Camille Lopez and Michael Fisher, Mark Fisher and Mary Elizabeth Williams.
