BEULAH FULLER FREEMAN was born a twin to the late Lewis and Lessie Fuller. Beulah was born on May 12, 1919 in Sumter County, Georgia. Preceding her in death was her devoted husband, LeRoy H. Freeman and beloved son, Charles Wardell. Beulah was also preceded in death by four sisters: Mariah Asbury, Idella James, Ola Mae Crawford and Lula Ford and two brothers: Yank and Mangle Fuller.

Following her school years, Beulah went to work at the New York Café in Americus where she honed her cooking skills. While there she met Charles Wardell, Sr. and married at an early age. Seven years passed and Beulah decided to move to Tuskegee, Alabama for better employment and opportunities. She got a job at Tuskegee Institute. After training, Beulah became an airplane mechanic in the Division of Aeronautics. She worked her way up to become one of the first African-American female crew chiefs, heading a team of mechanics.

It was at Tuskegee that Beulah met LeRoy Freeman, a young bombardier with the Army Air Corp, a segregated unit that would later be known as the "Tuskegee Airmen."

Beulah and Roy married and relocated to New York and then New Jersey. From this union, Valerie Jean was born in 1948.

Beulah started work at Western Electric Corp. in Kearny in 1953 and remained there until her retirement in 1984.

After retirement, Beulah became an active member of the Retirement Club at the Orange YWCA. She was also a member of the Pioneers of America.

Beulah will be remembered for her wonderful disposition and beautiful smile. She will also be remembered for her honesty, truthfulness and generosity as well as her love of family and good friends. She had a passion for fashion and stylish clothes and loved to go shopping. She also enjoyed gardening and having beautiful flowers on display. But most of all, she will be remembered as that lady who loved to play the slots in Atlantic City (and she was pretty lucky too).

Beulah is survived by: her devoted daughter, Valerie Jean Freeman; loving grandson, Charles L. Wardell and his wife, Lisa. Beulah also has six great grandchildren, Tucker, Andre, Cole, Isaac, Tate and Grace. She also leaves many nieces, nephews and close friends.
