<u>Obituary</u>

Cleo Hill Sr., a product of Newark, New Jersey's South Side (Malcolm X Shabazz) High School, who was acclaimed as one of the best basketball players during the late 50's and early 60's, died Monday, August 10th, at home, surrounded by his loving family. He was 77.

After a stellar high school career, Hill went on to Winston-Salem State Teachers College in North Carolina where he led his team to back-to-back CIAA Conference championships and eventually was voted the second-leading scorer in the school's history. Hill scored 2,488 points in his four seasons playing for Coach Clarence Gaines. After graduating in 1961, Cleo was drafted in the first round in 1961 by the St. Louis Hawks but given the tenor of the times, playing in a southern city was no place to be for an African American athlete, even the best. After leaving professional basketball, Cleo played in the old American Basketball League, the Eastern Pennsylvania Basketball League, and the Eastern League. He later became a successful college coach at Essex County College (ECC) in Newark, New Jersey, winning 489 games in his 24 years at Essex County College, amassing three Region 19 championships.

In 1975, Cleo became the athletic administrator at ECC. Under his leadership, the track and field team became one of the nation's best, winning six national championships. Hill also served on the Region 19 committees for soccer, cross country and men's basketball. In 2008, he was profiled in the ESPN documentary *Black Magic*, which chronicled legendary African-American basketball stars from historically Black colleges and universities. Hill's segment dealt with his 1961-62 NBA season with the St. Louis Hawks.

Mr. Hill was inducted into the South Side High School & Malcolm X Shabazz High School Hall of Fame, the Winston-Salem State University Hall of Fame, CIAA Hall of Fame and the Newark Athletic Hall of Fame.

During his later years, he worked with children and young adults as a playground coordinator for the Newark Public Schools' recreation program.

He is survived by: his loving wife of 53 years, Ann Hill; two devoted sons, Cleo Jr. and his wife, Regina and Cleon; his daughter, Kim Taylor; grandchildren, Khyara, Abdul, Ciara, Sanaa, Sage, and Cleo III; two great grandchildren, Mikhaliah and Mariah; and a host of family, friends and former players.

Cleo was predeceased by his parents, Ethel Morrison and James Hill; brothers, Sidney and Willie; and sister, Thelma.
