Obituary

William Morgan Morton III (Wiggy), son of the late William M. Morton and Alice Mamie Hartnett, was born on September 2, 1923 in Perth Amboy, New Jersey. Wiggy was educated in the Perth Amboy School System and, after graduation from high school, he studied drafting and welding at Lincoln Technical School. He furthered his studies at the Golden S. Clinton Institute in Pennsylvania and Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey.

Bill became a faculty member of Rutgers Extension Division and enjoyed many years lecturing on labor and civil rights issues. He was appointed Sub-District Director and Civil Rights Coordinator for the United Steelworkers of America and became a National Labor Negotiator, the first person of color to attain that status in our area. He later was appointed Coordinator for the New Jersey Organization of Active Retirees for the United Steelworkers of America/SOAR.

Bill became active in civil rights at an early age. He participated with the Negro Labor Council, was appointed chairman of the Central Jersey Civil Rights Council and was a coordinator for the 1957 March on Washington, led by Bayard Rustin. Bill was the Central Jersey Coordinator for the historic 1963 March on Washington, led by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He was the former chairman of the Woodbridge Township Human Relations Commission and received keys to several cities, including Perth Amboy and Woodbridge Township.

Bill's primary love was his work with the NAACP, having served for more than 45 years. Credits received from his work include Life Membership in the NAACP, Golden Heritage Membership, former President of the Perth Amboy Area Branch NAACP/12 years; recipient of the Million Dollar Membership Medallion, Bill Cosby National Life Membership Award, Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Award and the NAACP Diamond Jubilee Membership Award, to name a few.

Bill was a former member of the Supreme Court of New Jersey Advisory Committee on Judicial Conduct. Additionally, he was inducted into the Perth Amboy High School Hall of Fame and received the American Association of Affirmative Action Region II Community Service Award.

Bill was a 33° Mason, serving as a Past Worshipful Master of Morning Star Lodge #12, AF & AM of New Jersey. He was also a SCHINDER.

Bill's precious memories will always be cherished by his "best friend" and spouse, Mildred M. Morton; sons, Gary M. Morton (Denise) and Jerry H. Hall (Diane); daughter, Michelle Bressant; grandchildren, Porscha Dillard-Morton, Crystal Johnson (Channon); nieces, Toni House, Carolyn Edwards, Dr. Betty A. Morris (Byron), Mildred Swann (Frank), Janise Walker, Patricia Jones, Ivy Caceres (Juan), Markey Mack, Iris Pennyfeather; nephews, Charles Hall III (Iney), Ernest Sharpe (Curlie), Paul Hartnett (Beverly), James Hartnett, David Hall, and a host of other relatives and friends.

Bill was a member of The First Baptist Church of Woodbridge, Sewaren, NJ, having joined under the pastorate of Reverend Neva Lawson.
