<u>Obituary</u>

Lucy Jane Dandridge was born and raised in Prince George County, Virginia, on July 30, 1910. Her parents, Benjamin Harrison and Virginia Harrison – (later Barnes) were from Virginia. Lucy was one of ten children, five boys and five girls. All of her siblings preceded her in death.

During one of the darkest economic times in American history, "The Great Depression," Lucy worked on the Railroad. She later married Robert Dandridge and this marriage union was blessed with three children, Blondetta Smith, Robert Dandridge, Jr. and Audrean Gholston. She eventually left Virginia and moved to Baltimore, Maryland where she resided for a brief period. Later Lucy moved to New York City where she worked as a Nurse's Aid for many years.

Lucy's husband, Robert Dandridge, first child, Blondetta Smith, and youngest child, Audrean Gholston, preceded her in death. Lucy is survived by: her son, Robert Dandridge, Jr. In addition to her three children, Lucy's family would include grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great grandchildren, spanning five generations in all.

Lucy Dandridge learned who the true God is and his relationship to his son, Jesus Christ. Lucy dedicated her life to serve God and she was baptized as one of Jehovah's Witnesses at the history making 1958 International Convention of Jehovah's Witnesses held at Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds. The August 3, 1958, crowd numbered 123,707, a record that has stood throughout the rest of the stadium's history. She served in several congregations in the Bronx, New York.

Lucy Dandridge was known for her contagious smile and generous spirit. She was also known for her zealous ministry which always started with her family. She would often walk many blocks to pick-up her grandchildren and then they would walk with her many more blocks to the Kingdom Hall to attend her Christian meetings. She assisted a daughter and granddaughter in coming to know Jehovah. At the age of 100 she inspired many to do more in the ministry when she signed up to serve as an auxiliary pioneer.

Lucy was adored by all who met her and she left an indelible mark in their hearts. She will be dearly missed and remembered fondly with love and laughter. To us she was simply, Mother.


