

Reflections on the Life of Dr. Miles J. Austin

Rev. Dr. Miles J. Austin was truly one of God's chosen ones. Born July 10, 1933 to the proud parents of Charity and Simeon Austin in Sanford, FL His scholastic experience began at the Crooms Academy of Sanford, FL. The lessons learned there guided his zest for learning and he continued after a 3 year tour with the US Army. He Graduated from Florida A & M University of Tallahassee FL with a bachelor of Science Degree in Agricultural Science. While still in Florida served as the Vice Principle for Florida School for Boys, Okeechobee, FL. He married the former Jeanne Sistrunk (deceased), of that union were two children, Maria and Miles Jr. while he was in Florida.

In 1964, received a Bachelor of Divinity from the Howard University School of Religion Washington, DC and later he received his doctor of Ministry Degree from Drew University of New Jersey.

Dr. Austin was always striving to make a difference. He came to New Jersey where he accepted an offer to research and plan programs for underprivileged teenagers for the Newark YM-YWCA. Upon completing the assignment, he was offered a position of Youth Director for the YM-YWCA in Princeton and he moved to Princeton, NJ to serve as Youth Director at the YM-YWCA. He later returned to Newark just after the turmoil of 1967 involving Civil Disorders throughout our country. He was appointed Director of Disaster Relief for the Essex Chapter of the American Red Cross in 1968. During his assignment for the American Red Cross many have been recipients of the efforts put forth by him and the many other volunteers of the Red Cross Staff.

Although having been licensed to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ in 1960, it was 1970 that he was ordained at the Bethany Baptist Church of Newark and he then became the Pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Vauxhall, NJ. During his Pastorate at Calvary he sought to build on a solid foundation with the Christian message of "Faith, Hope and Love," with the greatest of these being "Love." In 1974 he accepted the call to become the pastor of the Bethel Baptist Church of Westfield. While serving as the Shepard of the Bethel Baptist Church he worked for the Department of Corrections as Supervisor of Social Services at Rahway State Prison, Rahway, NJ. This position transferred him to the Bayside State Prison in Maurice River Township, NJ during New Jersey Department of Corrections layoff crisis. He retired from the Department of Corrections in 1998. Having previously retired from the Bethel Baptist Church in 1989 he was recruited to serve as a Behavioral Therapist Clinician for the Community Educational Centers and Residential Community Center at Talbot Hall in Kearny, NJ.

Dr. Austin has spent most of his years serving humanity and has received many awards and citations that are too numerous to mention. All throughout his life he has given time and leadership to non-profit housing, colleges and universities, foreign students and community improvement association. Worked with several churches in New Jersey and Washington DC to assist them through the processes of selecting a Pastor. He has appeared on radio and T.V. in the Ministry of Jesus Christ. He founded the Life for Christ Foundation in 1978 to be able to assist first time offenders so that they will not become part of the criminal justice system and has worked with young people in that capacity until the time of his illness.

He has authored and published several books: "How I Was Supposed to Know God Had Created a Perfect World/Universe" and "The Threat to Christianity in the World Today" and has one manuscript in process for publishing entitled "Death and Transformation."

He has always had a special bond with his family and would do anything to keep them happy and healthy. He was predeceased by Daughter Maria Smith, Stepson, Kent R. Morgan and Brother, Simeon Austin Jr. and two Stepbrothers, Louis and James Bell. He leaves a legacy of love, strength, and precious memories for: a devoted wife of 28 years, Mary Morgan Austin; one son, Miles (Ann) Austin Jr.; Stepdaughters: Karin Hopkins and Kimberly (Joe) Handy; Granddaughters: Jennifer (Oscar) Arevalo, Jennifer Dawn Johnson, Ria Smith, Ray C. Smith, Kirsten Smith and Charity Smith; Two Grandsons: Brian Davis and Miles (Stacey) Austin 3rd, and Several Great Grandsons and Daughters. Also, two loving Sisters: Annie Mae Oxidine, Delray Beach, FL and Annette Norman, Orlando, FL and a host of Nieces and Nephews.


