The relationship would prepare her for her biggest blessing to come later in life.

In 1980, the Evans family moved to Roselle, N.J., its during this time frame Wanda came into her own, developing and flourishing into the woman we all knew and loved. Attending Abraham Clark High School, she played basketball and also became a cheerleader. She went on to graduate in June of 1985. Her next destination would be Union County College. It was there she met Marvin Williams, the two would marry a few years later. Although the union would not last, the two remained friends.

During that same time at the urging of her grandmother, Wanda took the test for N.J Bell. In 1988, she found her career and would work for N.J Bell for the next 28 years. In June of 1996 with that strong sense of family still going strong, Wanda took a road trip to Sumter, S.C to reconnect with her older sister Minnie Leaf. She met her nieces and nephew for the first time, and her Aunt Joann who she hadn't seen since early in her childhood.
