Obituary

Perstine Wesley was born in Luray, SC on August 14, 1934. To the Reverend John Henry Wesley and Ellenora Sanders Wesley. He was the third child of eight children. He was affectionately called "Steve", "Harry" and the "Mayor of North Broadway". Perstine was smitten by Maude Combs and after a ten year courtship they married in 1993.

In his early years his parents moved the family from Allendale, SC to Savannah, GA. Perstine was educated in the Allendale County, SC School System and later in the Chatham County school system in Savannah, GA. As a young man he was employed at Rakestraw Funeral Home, Savannah, GA as a mortician and later he was employed at Blair's Shoe Shop where he worked until he left for Yonkers, NY. In 1962 he became a business associate with his best friend Harry Ward of Harry's Shoe Repair. After his best friends passing he became the sole proprietor in 1965. He

kept the name of the shop to honor his friend as a business man. He retired after 50 years.



He took tremendous pride in being a part of the downtown area, serving as "Goodwill Ambassador", welcoming new businesses and serving as a mentor by advising and supporting new business ventures. He achieved success in the entrepreneurial arena but did not hesitate to "give back" to the community. He served humbly, never looking or expecting recognition. He worked tirelessly for the sake of those less fortunate.

Perstine started a city- wide organization called "Wesley and Friends" that benefited two pivotal community service organizations: The Yonkers YWCA and the Nepperhan Community Center, as well as scholarship awards, In 2009 "Wesley and Friends" would start their own Food pantry for seniors, his organization partnered with the Yonkers Fire Department, and held an annual coat and clothing drive for children and adults.

Perstine along with former Mayor Phil Amicone and the Yonkers Police Department, successfully held the Community 5K Run/Walk race that encouraged positive relationships with our children and Yonkers police officers in 2007- 2010.

His vigorous fundraising, recruitment of chefs, and donations of in-kind goods and services, has been a driving force behind the success of the Yonkers YWCA Celebrity Chefs; he enjoyed serving as event co-chair.

It would be the greatest ever told


Of a kind and loving father
