Obituary



Richard Spencer Monroe, Jr. was born March 10, 1943 to the late Richard Spencer Monroe, Sr. and Margaret Monroe, nee Daniels at Harlem Hospital. He departed this life on Tuesday, January 24, 2017 at the VA Medical Center in Manhattan. He was the eldest of five children born to this union and grew up in Harlem. Affectionately known as "Ricky", he attended elementary and high school in New

York City before attending City College where he earned his Bachelor of Social Work degree. One summer day on 133rd Street, he met the woman he would marry and often referred to her "big legs" as the main feature that caught his eye. On Friday, June 13, 1966, Richard pledged his love to Thelma Robinson in a civil ceremony in Manhattan, a union that lasted 50 years, 7 months, 11 days. From this union were born three children: Richard Spencer III (deceased), Ryan Philip (deceased) and Margaret Isabelle.

Richard often spoke about the numerous jobs he held in the garment district in lower

Manhattan and as a mixologist at Smalls Paradise and Wells Restaurant in Harlem. He was drafted into the United States Army where he served our country during the Vietnam Era. He trained with the 101st Airborne Division, received the National Defense Service Medal and Sharpshooter Marksmanship Badge with M-14 before being honorably discharged in 1969. Upon returning to civilian life, Richard continued his service to our city



as one of "New York's Finest" with the New York City Police Department. He began his career as a "beat cop" whose presence in the community was appreciated and everyone knew his name. He continued to work diligently within the Department, he earned commendations for his writing and rose to rank of Sergeant. He was a



dedicated member of Local 237 Teamsters Union for 25 years upon his retirement in 1995. During his young adult life, he played pickup basketball in the local parks, enjoyed riding his many bicycles, watching sports on television and eating Chinese food. He was a devoted husband, father and grandfather who worked hard to provide for his family, gave generously to those around him and took great pride in seeing those he loved

happy. He would go the extra mile to help anyone who needed assistance. He is deeply loved and will be greatly missed.

Richard is survived by: his devoted wife, Thelma; daughter, Margaret (Steven); grandchildren, Joseph Richard and Stefanie-Grace Monroe Woods; his dear aunt, Margaret Monroe of New York City; brothers, Ronald, Robert and Reginald Monroe of New York City; brothers-in-law, George G.
