Maggie Lee Williams was born March 3, 1945 in Chattanooga, Tennessee to the late Ruth Mae and Samuel Shelton Sr. She was one of six siblings. She attended public schools in Chattanooga, Tennessee. In the early nineteen sixties, Lee as she was affectionately known to everyone left Tennessee and relocated to New York City. Where she married the love of her life Arthur Williams Sr. and from that union five children were born, Cheryl, Ardrella, Arthur Jr., Darryl, and Charlette. Lee was a dedicated housewife and mother and supported her husband and children in whatever they tried to accomplish in life. Lee always pushed them to be better than whatever they thought they could be. She was the mother that could always be counted on to stand by and support her children with an abundance of love, guidance and support in whatever circumstances they found themselves in.

After rearing all of her children to adult status and helping raise her grandchildren, Lee continued her education and earned her Bachelor of Science Degree in Early Childhood Education and a Master's Degree in Social Work in New York City. She was employed by New York City Board of Education where she took on the awesome task of educating the emotionally disturbed students of New York City.

Her home was always opened to anyone in distress or trouble or just in need of someone to listen and show they cared. She was not afraid to involve herself with the ills that plague all communities. Many potential violent altercations and domestic disputes were prevented and resolved by the intervention of Lee daring to get involved with a stern lecture or sending someone on a mission to remove one party from the scene or an invite to come inside and cool off and listen to sound reasoning. Lee was a confident, friend and mentor to many both young and old. She was a spiritual, loving and affectionate person with a laugh and smile that could light up any room or brighten up any situation. She accepted and trusted her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with all of her heart and tried to live the life as prescribed by Christ when he commanded that "ye love one Another "

Her hobbies were playing spades, cooking, singing, dancing and enjoying family. Lee studied the game of spades and was known for starting the four day weekend spades marathon on the fifteenth floor of 1368. Which was a fellowship in itself that brought about people from all walks of life to mingle and get to know each other.

On May 25, 2017, at the Einstein Hospital, God came to call his own. She was preceded in death by her husband, Arthur Williams, daughter, Ardella Drake, brother, Gene Dale Evans, Mother In –Law; Lera Williams, niece, Sharon Williams, and nephew, Melton Williams. Lee departed this earthly life and went on home to be with her Lord. She will be missed by all.
