Mary Elizabeth Johnson was born on May 15, 1940 in Wilmington, North Carolina to the late Walter Albert Johnson and Mary Elizabeth Johnson (nee Carter). She was the eldest of six children (three sisters and two brothers). Bearing the same name as her mother, she was often called "Little Mary Elizabeth" throughout her early childhood years.

Mary received her education throughout the Wilmington public school system and in May 1958, she earned her high school Diploma as a graduate of Willinston High School. Less than two months later on July 17, 1958, Mary became a mother for the first time giving birth to a son, David Michael Johnson, the eldest of her five children. Mary was known for having a very determined, outgoing and fearless type of spirit. She was always looking for change, advancement and new opportunities, a sort of free spirit so to speak. Their time together would be short lived and she was widowed due to the passing of her husband. She eventually found love again and her union with the late Bert Henderson, Sr. of Wilmington, NC would produce two daughters, Bertrina M. Johnson and Brenda G. Johnson. She worked for a short time as a Bell Atlantic long distance operator and then as a cook for The Langston Hughes Head Start program in her neighborhood. But it wasn't until many years later that she would meet Donald Whitehead, the man that would ultimately become her soulmate, spending a total of 37 years together. Donald dedicated his life after retirement to giving Mary the type of hands on care that only true love could render. He lovingly cared for her up until the very moment of her unforeseen and untimely death. Mary was preceded in death by her sisters, Juanita Johnson and Willie Mae Johnson and her brothers, William Johnson and Walter Johnson.

Mary was well known for being a very outspoken woman. She spoke her mind at all times and never bit her tongue for anyone. She often "said what she meant and meant what she said" and was well respected throughout her neighborhood and with family and friends alike because of it. She prided herself on being very independent and it showed throughout her everyday life. She was an elegant and sophisticated lady who harnessed a certain level of class like only she could.
