Mrs. Ingrid Arnim (nee Williams), 63, homemaker, retired food distributor, and philanthropist, passed away on June 22, 2015, with her family by her side in New York City.

Mrs. Arnim was born October 7, 1951, in Montego Bay, Jamaica, West Indies to Lucille Richards and Edgar Williams. Her mother was born in Panama when Lucille's father was a law enforcement captain at the Panama Canal Zone (at the time of its construction in the early 20th century). Mrs. Arnim's mother was a talented nurse with the St. John's Nursing Brigade and her father was a well-known and respected farmer in St. Thomas, Jamaica.

Mrs. Arnim joined her mother and emigrated to the United States from Jamaica in her early twenties and called Manhattan her new home; initially near City College and then Morningside Heights, as well as Locust Valley on the north shore of Long Island later in her life. Her daughter Sharon arrived in the U.S. shortly thereafter and she gave birth in 1977 to her first son, Herbert Chris.

Ingrid was employed at a successful food distribution concern, Diversified Foods, in Lower Manhattan and then Yonkers. She was always lauded for her tremendous productivity and work ethic; so much so that she was often made to perform supervisory duties. Mrs. Arnim was extremely conscientious and made it to work without fail, even though she often left her home at 4AM by train and bus to make it to Westchester. In 1983, she met her future husband, a retired NYC train conductor, on one of these fateful trips. They had a son, Harry, two years later. The close-knit family always included her mother, Lucille, who lived in her home, as well, for many years.

Ingrid took unparalleled care of people, particularly her own and other's children, and was well-known for her giving spirit and tender nature. The loving mother provided unconditional love to many (as if they were her own children) and was philanthropic to many when they needed her help the most. Ingrid possessed a strong sense of justice and fairness that inspired many—including her children, family and friends--to always try to be better citizens and to assist others whenever possible. Setting an example, she opened her heart and home on many occasions and never asked for reciprocation. Mrs. Arnim often donated her time and resources to feed the hungry during the holidays, beautify her neighborhood, or assisted in important civic affairs. Her pride in her children buoyed her and, likewise, her children had nothing but utmost respect and pride in her. Nothing made her happier than to see her children graduate from high schools and universities and she shared thoroughly in these accomplishments. Ingrid cared dutifully for her autistic son, Harry, and was a shoulder to lean on for her other son and daughter. Ingrid's daughter Sharon passed away ten years ago, but she often would attend events in honor of her daughter's political engagement. She was so happy to be involved and make a difference in our world—Ingrid had plans to do so much more before she became ill.

Among her many loves, Mrs. Arnim loved traveling and vacationing (particularly to St. Augustine, Florida!), gardening, the ocean (and its water), mermaid lore, food, music, street fairs, beautiful jewelry, the color blue and all things spiritual. Ingrid's inclusive style of spirituality was completely accepting of everyone's faith and lifestyle—she was the last to judge others and the first to make others feel completely included and at ease. A trendsetter in bridging communities and people across differences, she was certainly ahead of her time in her "freedom to love" others regardless of race, religion, skin color, sexual preference, nationality, or any other feature that tends to divide otherwise good people.

Mrs. Ingrid E. Arnim is survived and deeply missed by: her husband and partner of over 30 years, Edward Arnim; her two sons, H. Chris Wool and Harry Arnim; four step-daughters, Arlene, Beth, Jennifer and Rosemary; brother, Jose Richards; sister, Edna Monica Stennett; three brothers-in-law, Robert Arnim, John Arnim, and Theodore Arnim, and their spouses, Meybol, Eladia, and Brita; two sisters-in-law, Margaret Arnim and her spouse, Carol, as well as Catherine Arnim McGoldrick and her partner, Robert. Mrs. Arnim is also survived by six nieces, Sandra Forrester and her spouse, Carl, Dawn Stennett, Juliet Stennett, Claudia Stennett, Cassandra Richards and Charmaine Richards; and four nephews, Michael Stennett, Oliver Richards, Andrew Richards, and Morris McKay. She also loved her many grandnieces and grandnephews whom she loved very much. She has many other loved ones hailing from Jamaica, such as her paternal cousin, Lerlene Howell. She is predeceased by her mother, Lucille Richards; daughter, Sharon Thompson; brother, Fritzoy Richards, and stepson, Edward Arnim.
