
Honoring The Life of Willie Lee Clark

<u>Obituary</u>

Willie Lee Clark, the son of the late Jack and Susie (Phillips) Clark, was born on March 8, 1933 in Gaffney, South Carolina. Willie entered eternal rest on June 29, 2017 at home in East Orange, New Jersey.

Willie was affectionately known as "Boss" to family and "Mr. Willie" to friends.

He left Gaffney, S.C., at 14 years old, to live with an older sister in Newark. As one of 10 siblings, he had every job that you can think of in his life. He made cheese and worked in a bakery. He repaired machinery at a copper company and was a short order cook at a Newark restaurant. At one point, he was a welder at a shipping yard and sold vegetables and other wares from a horse-drawn wagon that he rented.

As a young adult, Willie served in the U.S. Army during the Korean Conflict. After service, he met and married the late Shirley Clark and together raised three sons, Ricky, Willie Jr. and Andrew, and one daughter, Cynthia. In 1975, Willie met his current wife Viola "Ann" and they married in 1981. He raised four step-children and three grandchildren, providing a stable home for a host of other relatives along the way.

After service in the Army, Willie went on to work as a contractor with Raymond Bros. Construction of Englishtown, NJ for almost 30 years and then managed his own contracting business for another 20 years in New Jersey. After retirement, he volunteered his time and creative talents as an Assistant Foreman for Habitat for Humanity Greater Newark for 18 years helping Habitat build over 80 homes in Newark, Irvington and West Orange. "Mr. Willie" worked with Habitat until the age 84.

He had an incredible work ethic. As a construction contractor, he built homes, renovated kitchens and baths, applied new floorings, and tarred roofs. There was never a job too big or too small. He often morphed into car mechanic mode – changing parts, brake pads, mufflers, bumpers, you name it. If it had instructions, he would tackle it.

Willie was a devoted member of the Mount Vernon Missionary Baptist Church of Newark NJ. He enjoyed bible studies and reading scriptures with his sisters.

Willie is survived by his loving and devoted wife, Viola Ann Armstrong-Owens of 36 years. He is survived by his sons, Ricky (Valerie) Clark Sr., Willie Clark Jr. and Andrew Clark, and his daughter, Cynthia Clark Washington; his step-children, Addison Eugene (Beverly) Owens, Stacey (Rhonda) Owens, and Annette Christine Owens; and 23 grandchildren, 15 great-grandchildren and 2 great great-grandchildren. He was especially proud of his grandson, Justin Alexander Owens, whom he raised. He is also survived by 3 of 9 siblings, Mae S. Davis, Victoria Young, and Rosa Rich.

Willie will be remembered by his family and friends as a loving, generous, and quiet force of goodness. And when meeting Willie anyone could see just how much his family, especially grandchildren and great-grandchildren, truly meant to him. He touched so many people through Habitat for Humanity Greater Newark and will be missed.
