<u>Obituary</u>

Victor A. Callender was born on January 31, 1936 in New York City. He was the second child and youngest son of Victor and Gertrude Callender. Victor and his three siblings Dennis (deceased), Eleanor (deceased) and Barbara were raised in Harlem at 27 Morningside Avenue.

Victor went to Howard Hughes High School and studied textiles. His first job after graduation was at the Echo Scarves company. The women in his family loved it because he always brought home the nicest scarves as gifts. Throughout his life he had a fondness for touching items of clothing and noting the quality of the fabric.

Victor served in the Army for two years and he had the pleasure of serving in Hawaii. Since he did not serve during wartime he was able to play on different sports teams during his service and enjoy that part of the world. He was honorably discharged in 1960 and returned home to New York City.

When he returned home from the service he had two job offers waiting for him from the Police Department and the Fire Department. He did not want to use a gun so he opted to join the Fire Department. This would be one of the best decisions of his life.

He moved out of his family home on Morningside but stayed in the same neighborhood. It was soon after he moved out that he met the love of his life, Lena Johnson. They would marry in April 1965 (another great decision) and this union produced two daughters, April and Karen.

The Callender family moved to a brand new residence at 139th Street on Riverside Drive called River View Towers. Life in this building provided the family with an incredible community of friends, travel buddies and party opportunities. Victor would reside here until his passing.

Victor treasured his time in the NYC Fire Department and cherished the lifelong friends he made with his colleagues and their families. Victor was also a lifetime member of the Vulcans, the fraternal organization for Black Firefighters. He never missed a Vulcan event or card game. Weekends and Holidays were often spent at barbeques, parties and vacations with these special friends.

Victor retired from the Fire Department in December 1989 after 29 years of service. Soon after, his wife retired from her job with a local Assemblywoman. With both daughters in college, they looked forward to a life of relaxation. Unfortunately, Lena passed from stomach cancer in 1991 and Victor went on to live life as a widower.

The next chapter of his life was also rewarding as he was surrounded by faithful friends, his devoted daughters and eventually, a new love. He loved to party, he loved to dance, he loved to travel and he loved food! All of these were plentiful in this phase of life.

Unfortunately, in 2016 he began his battle with kidney disease and it would slow him down for a minute. However, in true Callender style he fought back and found new ways to stay connected and enjoy life.

On April 20th, Victor Callender entered the hospital to start the fight of his life against COVID 19. He battled the virus for over a month and we all thought he had won – but on May 30th his "pure heart" stopped and our world was changed forever.

Victor is survived by: his sister, Barbara; his two daughters, April and Karen; his nephews, Russell, Vernon and Gary; his nieces, Renee, Denise and Natalie; a host of grandnieces and grandnephews; and so many loving lifelong friends.
