We are indeed sorrowing. It is to the honor and glory of God that we gather here today to pay our last respect to our beloved mother.

Our mother, **Mrs. Martha Aime Dagbatsa** was born on 28th, August 1944 at Ejisu, the Asante region of Ghana, West Africa. She was the sixth child of the late Mr. James Kwaku Amoateng of the Aduana clan and the late Maame Mary Gyamfuah Poku of the Asona clan.

She started her elementary school education at Ejisu Roman Catholic School. She went on to Agogo Training College to pursue the study of nursing. She soon learned that she didn't like dealing with the dead and so she decided to pursue another career. Later she worked at Ghana National Trading Corporation (UNTC) as a manager. She also worked with Union Trading Company (UTC) as a manager as well. She later moved to the United Kingdom to further her education. Upon completion, she returned to Ghana.

In 1991, she met and married the widower and New York State social worker, Mr. Anthony Aime Dagbatsa, who preceded her in death in 2007. Through this marriage, she inherited four adult children and grandchildren. They are Mrs. Philippa Atiogbe-Birikorang, Mr. Nana Kofi Appiahene Asare, Mrs. Antoinette Kearney and Mr. Anthony (Joe) Aime-Dagbatsa.

She attended Lehman Community College and earned a certificate in early childhood education. Before becoming a teacher's aide at the Tremont-Crotona Day Care Center, she also worked as a home health aide. She retired in December 2006 due to her husband's battle with cancer. She sacrificed and cared for him by his deathbed, for two years until he took his last breath.

She came to know the Lord as her personal savior in 1990. She was a faithful member of the Church of the Revelation, in Bronx, New York. She was a diligent, committed servant of the Lord, who was also the leader of the women's prayer group.

On the late morning hours of January 18th, 2022, the Lord called her home to glory after being rescued from a fatal and tragic gas explosion of our family home on 869 Fox Street, Bronx, New York. She was preceded in death by two brothers and one sister, Kwadwo Abebrese Amoateng, Joseph Kwaku Amoateng, and Theresa Amoateng. She is survived by her brothers and sisters, who are, Kwame Amoateng, Lucy Amoateng, Evelyn Amoateng, Felicia Amoateng, Agnes Amoateng, and Patrick Kwadwo Amoateng.
