Obituary

Joseph Lanier Mercy Sr. (Mercius, Djo or Joe) was born on April 27, 1937, to Agelia Andreus and Joseph Mercy. He was one out of seven children. Joe -as affectionately knownhas always claimed both Boudette and Danache in Dessalines Haiti as his birthplace.

Joe enjoyed every role he embodied- that of son, husband, father, brother, uncle, cousin, mentor and friend.

Towards the end of his secondary schooling, he moved to Saint Marc and stayed with his older brother Ernest. He worked at ODVA and started a small business with a friend he had met there. Subsequently, he migrated to the United States and met Clement Joachim. Together they became pioneers establishing an enclave of small Haitian-owned businesses in Elizabeth, New Jersey.

Joe worked many years in Rahway for the Regina Company, a vacuum manufacturer. However, when asked to relocate to Mississippi, he decided to stay in Elizabeth, New Jersey and start his own business. Joseph Mercy alias Mercius or Joe embarked on the passion of his life to fulfill his dreams of becoming an entrepreneur. He proceeded to make a name for himself amassing properties and embarking on several business endeavors in the Elizabeth area.

In May 1983, Joe was the first Haitian to ever obtain an ABC liquor license in the City of Elizabeth, New Jersey. It allowed him to become the proud owner of International Wines and Liquors for years. Joseph was also the owner and operator of American Livery, a taxicab business. Subsequently, he also started a cargo service which facilitated the transport of personal goods from the States to Haiti. He also founded small businesses in Haiti, most prominently a Water Company in Saint Marc.

In addition to his business activities Joe was an activist and a community organizer, giving opportunity to Haitians and Haitian Americans to be heard and advocating for them.

On May 21, 1994, Joseph Lanier Mercy in collaboration with the Haitian American Cultural and Civic Association (H.A.C.C.A.) obtained the Resolution from the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders allowing the Haitian Flag Day to be celebrated yearly in the City of Elizabeth, New Jersey- how fitting that he passed away on Haitian Flag Day on May 18- a true honor to his memory and legacy.

As the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Josephat Enterprises he served his Haitian community through multiple initiatives. Joe even had his own soccer team called Vedette that proudly wore the colors of Red and White.

Phanie Dorval and Joseph Mercy were married on November 10, 1975. They have three awesome children Yvrose, Joseph Leo Jr. and Ecleynne. On April 24, 2011, Joseph Mercy and Phanie Mercy renewed their marriage vows at the Church of God of Bethesda. The couple had formed a friendship that was impenetrable.

Joseph is survived by his beloved wife Phanie Mercy, his children: Yvrose, Joseph Leo Jr, spouse Shawnna, and Ecleynne Mercy, Esq; his son in law Leonard Louis and his eight grandchildren: Eric, Lesly, Terrence, Jovannia, Sarah, Nijoe, Summer and Kyani.

Joseph is also survived by his sister Marie Mercy and, by several nephews, nieces and their families:

Leonne (Altie), Ida, Christophe, Via, Oscar and their spouses, children, and grand children Eliota (Tiyote), Lemec, Moulo, Cavanac, Michelin, Ketia, their spouses, and children Kareen (Dr. Joseph), Yveto, Eddy, Robens, Guillaubert, Marissa, Bryant, their spouses and children. Edzer, his child, and Francy Nadia, John, Dolcine, their spouses and children Soline, Ernst-France and their children.
