While raising her children, Rosena gave her life to Jesus Christ and was the rock and prayer warrior of her family. She always gave wise, Godly advice and prayed for pretty much everyone she encountered. Rosena was the person that family members called for prayer, when going through any challenges in life and after she prayed for you, you walked away with the assurance and peace that God would work everything out. The godly life that she lived influenced the lives of her children and grandchildren and laid the foundation of the scripture for her family, Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child.." She had a strong faith that as she faced life's challenges through her lifetime, buried each of her children and faced health challenges at the end, we knew that the strength that she displayed was based in her unrelenting faith in God. Her faith in God was unbreakable.

Rosena was also an amazing cook and was known for her delicious sweet potato pies, coconut cakes and chocolate cakes. She showed her love through her cooking and baking. If she knew you were coming over, she would make sure that she had a delicious meal prepared for you when you got there and always prayed for you before you left.

Rosena Singleton lived a long, loved and faith-filled life (98 years and 10 months) and after health challenges over the past few years, on July 18th, 2022, she was called home to be with the Lord. 
