Donna Louise Hubbard was born on June 2, 1961 in Brooklyn, New York. She received her early education in the New York City Public Schools. After high school, she attended and graduated with honors from Allegheny College, Allegheny, Pennsylvania.

Donna's career at the Brooklyn Public Library began as a part timer in high school and continued throughout her college years.

Donna LOVED the Brooklyn Public Library more than can be described. She started her career as a Librarian Trainee in 1984, receiving her Masters of Librarian Science from Pratt Institute in 1986. After completing her studies, she became an Education and Job Information Center Librarian offering daily reference and research assistance at the Central Library. Moving progressively through the system, she served as a Branch Library Manager for the Brower Park, Rugby, Flatbush, and Ryder locations from 1992-2001. As a Cluster Leader from 2001-2004, Donna strengthened the library's overall operations and excelled in community outreach across DeKalb, Macon, Saratoga, and Washington Irving libraries.

As an Assistant Director from 2004-2011, Donna's presence and professionalism was always greatly appreciated and welcomed. She was particularly proud of her key role in opening the new Kensington Library which, at the time, was the standard for environmentally friendly facilities. She also worked tirelessly to provide services to people impacted by Hurricane Sandy and helped lead efforts to reopen six damaged libraries within one year after the devastating storm.

In her most recent role as a Regional Director, Donna continued to work closely with elected officials, the New York City Department of Education, community organizations and others to spread the word out about their wonderful resources and services. She was a tireless advocate for libraries and was a mainstay at City Hall and at Lobby Day in Albany fighting to protect the library's funding. Some of the other initiatives Donna was most excited to participate in included the Bike the Branches Campaign, NYC Summer Meals Program, Summer Reading, Open House events, and Network training. Donna was also instrumental in developing standards in library administrative tasks, which included collection building, right-sizing staffing, and service hours, and most notably, coordinating branch closings and reopening procedures - a process that stands until this day.

Over the course of her thirty years in a managerial capacity, Donna served to mentor and train new library managers. She was highly respected and left an indelible mark on the professional lives of those under her wing. She had a natural ability to establish a rapport with staff, seeking their input and providing resources they would need to deliver excellent customer service. As she would say it would create "a win-win" for staff and patrons.

In ways big and small, Donna had an impact on many individuals' career at Brooklyn Public Library. She taught her coworkers all how to be dedicated professionals and how to work hard while still having fun. She was always game for an impromptu dance-off, eating cake and drinking her coffee. Most importantly, they learned from Donna how to be responsive to the communities.

For many years, after a long day at work, Donna found time to volunteer on Community Board 4 in Bushwick, Brooklyn. She served on the Youth & Education Committee, as well as the House & Land Use Committee. After relocating from Bushwick to East Flatbush, she continued as an active member of Community Board 17.

Donna's dedication to her career mirrored her dedication to her church. She was an active member of Bethany Baptist Church for over 50 years. Donna was a member of the Youth Fellowship Choir in her early years at Bethany. She was a member of Bethany's Adult Choir, and a member of Women of Worship. She was also a member of Bethany Dance Ministry and Bethany's Hospitality Ministry. Any way Donna could use her time and talent to help others she was willing. Donna had a special place in her heart for the senior members of the church. She always went above and beyond to make sure their needs were met. All of Donna's accomplishments professional and spiritual were fueled by the incredible spirit formed by the loving environment she helped create for her friends and family.

As a family we can never express in words what Donna meant to us, and the incredible blessing it was to experience her laughter, humor, and those incredible dance moves. She was a catalyst of eminence stature and respect. Simply put (SHE WAS THE BEST OF US). Her effort and unselfishness knew no boundaries. We are all better humans for having shared this time on earth with her spirit. Donna's language was love and she spoke it fluently with her actions and demeanor.
