

<u>Obituary</u>

Victor George Bethune was born in Kingston, Jamaica, on March 4, 1936. Very early recognized as an exceptional student, his mother, then principal of an elementary school in Kingston Jamaica, allowed him to chart his own course. He matriculated at Kingston Technical High School at 10 years old, but even that was not challenging enough for him. At 13 years of age, he aced all 10 "Senior Cambridge" subject exams – thus graduating with the class that year and was awarded his high school diploma from Kingston Technical High School.

He attended and worked at the University of the West Indies in the physiology department for about four years and soon thereafter migrated to the United States of America to study chemical engineering at the Milwaukee Institute and physiology at Marquette University. He was awarded the Legislators' Scholarship in 1959 as well as an Abbot Research Fellowship which was renewed from 1962 – 1973.

In 1965 Victor received a PhD in organic chemistry from Northwestern University in Chicago, IL. While at Northwestern he was awarded the Lubrizol Fellow Research Grant for three years and joined Esso Corporation that year in their research and development department. Out of that association came multiple patents some of which are still being used by ExxonMobil Corporation today.

After Esso, his interest in cancer research took him first to Mt. Sinai Hospital and then Memorial Hospital for Cancer and Allied Diseases both in NYC. He became a Research Associate there and in 1970 assumed the position of Director of the Biochemistry Department at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center.

He was single handedly responsible for the implementation of laboratory automation in both diagnostic enzymology and biochemical determinations which he introduced as the keynote speaker at the Technicon International Symposium in Frankfurt, Germany in 1974. On that trip he toured multiple other European cities assisting Technicon in their automation implementation. While at MSKCC, he initiated and developed the New York City lab certification chemistry technician exams which became the standard for all NYC hospitals. In 1973, he became Chairman of the Scientific Program Committee of the National Meeting of the American Association of Clinical Chemists, an organization of which he had been a long-term member.

Despite all his stellar achievements, he decided to change career paths and in 1975 he enrolled in medical school at New Jersey College of Medicine and Dentistry in Newark, NJ and graduated with his MD degree in 1979. An internship in Internal Medicine followed at St. Vincent's Hospital in NYC and he subsequently trained in ophthalmology at the prestigious Manhattan, Eye, Ear, and Throat Hospital. After graduating from that program, he opened a private practice in ophthalmology in Brooklyn, NY which he maintained for almost 30 years.

He was a licensed physician in New York and board certified in ophthalmology with admitting privileges at Interfaith Medical Center, Woodhall Medical Center and Long Island College Hospital in Brooklyn. In addition, he regularly operated at Manhattan, Eye, Ear, and Throat Hospital where he also maintained admitting privileges.

Victor tirelessly volunteered his time and expertise and traveled with several groups – including the Caribbean Medical Mission to parts of the West Indies, South America, and Africa. Over the years he received multiple awards from many churches and community organizations for his talks and contributions to their health fairs and the like.

His leadership and exceptional intellect continued to be demonstrated and sought out by many including colleagues and corporations. The consummate teacher he continued to be pursued in and sought out as a lecturer nationally for many years.

Despite his declining health over the past several years, the vicissitudes of aging never diminished his gentle spirit, his unassuming nature or his warm smile.

Victor leaves to mourn his loss, his partner Yvonne Bourne, his sons and daughter David George (Lisa), Dana Marie (Darrin) and Michael George; his grandsons Oliver Elijah George, Josiah Alexander George, granddaughter Dylan Olyvia, as well as Ian Christopher (Meliza), Noel Emilio and Angel Christopher (Yvonne's son and grandsons) in addition to a long list of adopted aunts, nieces, nephews, grandnieces/ grandnephews, cousins, friends, and people whose lives he has touched. He was predeceased by his mother Mary Kelly, and his childhood best friend Dr. Keith O. Roper of Kingston and Chicago.
