OBITUARY

Roy James Thomas was born August 8, 1941, in Jersey City, NJ, to the late Eugene and Ruby Thomas. He departed this life at home on Monday, April 3, 2023. Roy attended the public school system in Jersey City, NJ. Afterwards, Roy entered the US Army where he served four (4) tours of duty in Vietnam. While serving in the US Army, Roy earned and received several medals, including the Bronze Star for Heroic/Meritorious Achievement, the National Defense Service medal, the Vietnam Service medal, the Distinguished Service medal, and the Good Conduct medal. In addition, Roy earned and received several Expert Weapons Qualification badges. Roy truly was a dedicated soldier in the US Army, and Roy also was a great patriot who loved his country, the USA.

Because Roy was so dedicated to the US Army, and because Roy was such a great patriot to the USA, he became an outstanding spokesperson for the Veterans Administration on a volunteer basis after he completed his last tour of duty in Vietnam. And since Roy was raised with strong Christian values, he always tried to do all he could do for anyone, whether that person was a veteran or not. Roy believed in the "Golden Rule" in Luke 6:31, and in Matthew 7:12, which says "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you"

As a man of faith, Roy was a member of Calvary Church, where he volunteered to work in many outreach ministries, including advocating for the homeless, feeding the hungry, and visiting the sick and shut-in. Roy's motto was "If I can help somebody as I travel along, if I can cheer somebody with a word or song, if I can show somebody how they're traveling wrong, then my living shall not be in vain." Roy's living was not in vain as many who knew him will say. Music also was one of Roy's "loves" during his life. Roy passionately loved and sang all types of music. Professionally, he sang with The Manhattans for many years, and ultimately, Roy started his own group called The Ideal's Quintette. After serving in the US Army, and after performing as a professional singer, Roy found a new love and decided to unite in marriage to Evelena McLucas. Roy became a loving husband and a doting dad to Pamela. Roy's love for Lena and for Pam inspired him to make his family his priority because Roy always wanted the best for his family. Roy worked at the homeless shelter, he worked as a security guard at the welfare department and he also worked and eventually retired from the post office. He really was a hard working man.

Roy was preceded in death by four brothers, Eugene, George, Thomas, and Norman Thomas, and by two sisters Sheryll and Barbara Thomas. He leaves to mourn and cherish his memory, his wife, Evelena McLucas-Thomas, two devoted children, Abdur-Raheem Muhammad and Pamela McLucas, one daughter-in-law Carla Muhammad, eight grandchildren, Darius(Yanique), Jamal, Nadiyah(Mike), Yasmeen(Lamont), Safiyyah, Abdur-Rahman, Aliyah and Abdul-Aziz, six great grandchildren, a sister, Paula Chestine, a special aunt, Florida "Flo" Johnson, a special cousin, Jaqueline "Jackie" Woolford, and a host of beloved nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.
