After the birth of four boys, Kelvin Morgan and Hyacinth Eugene Williams received a blessing of a baby girl on July 7, 1962 on the beautiful island of St. Kitts. They named her, Joycelyn Ellora Williams. Joycelyn was the only girl amongst five boys after Winston was born and later, she had three other sisters.

Joycelyn was a dainty, and courageous person, who held high standards for herself and her siblings, which she carried into her adult years. Growing up in the McKnight area, she attended the Irish Town Primary School, the Basseterre Junior High School, and Basseterre Senior High School.

Her Childhood and Kittitian Church Life

Joycelyn, better known as 'Lyn' attended the Wesley Methodist Church, very early in life, she received Jesus Christ as her personal Lord and Savior. She was involved in various areas of the church. She was a member of the Youth Fellowship, after its discontinuance, she joined the newly formed group - Christian Arts and Cultural Organization (CACO). She was a member of the Junior Choir and 2nd St. Kitts Girl's Brigade and remained an active participant achieving the rank of a Lieutenant Officer. She was a part of the St. Kitts National Secretary Association. Joycelyn served as a Sunday School Teacher, and as the Secretary of the Circuit Office from 1981-2001. As an employee of the church, she under took her role with dignity and tenacity and executed every level with professionalism in her secretarial position. She was always mindful that God required the best of her and she did not give anything less. She was plain in her speech, obedient in her actions and was able to guide ministers in the office procedures. She was welcoming to new ministers and maintained a high level of respect for everyone who walked through the doors of the Methodist Annex. Most of all, she loved God and her church.

Her Care for Family

Although, she did not have any children of her own, she found it her duty to assist her brother Lucas in raising his daughters Bernadette and Mayra. This she took very seriously, and she did her best in teaching them spiritual principals. She was always present for her siblings her young brother Winston and sisters, Stacia, Terecia and Amanda. She made every effort to know what was happening in their lives and was able to give sound advice when anything was wrong. She was interested in their love lives and found it her duty as big sister, especially in Stacia's life to know who like her sister. Her comments would be, " Mi sister... then the advice would follow. Aunty Lyn was seen by the young ones as disciplinarian but all she wanted us to understand life must be cherished and taken with great dignity and pride, and a good name is better than riches.

Her American Journey

In 2001, she migrated to Puerto Rico to be with her mother, Hyacinth. Then moved to New York where she resided. She continued her studies, as a Nursing Aid: EKG Examiner. In this career, she had the opportunity to give daily care to the elderly and persons who were unable to take care of themselves. Lyn did this job as a caretaker with great pride. In taking care of the elderly was a reminder of the times she spent time with her late maternal grandmother Alicia Phillip. Residing and working in the USA, Joycelyn never forgotten God and her church life, she became a member of the Crawford Memorial United Methodist Church in Bronx, served on the Ushers Board and extended her services in other ministries. These attributes showed her love for her Lord in all aspect.

It was Joycelyn's intention at age 60, to back her federation of St. Kitts and Nevis to be closer to her family, however, in 2020, in the heat of COVID-19, she became infected and affected. The COVID-19 infection severely damaged her lungs. This began the long Covid journey. But God was not finished with her yet. Lyn remained steadfast, immovable and trusting in a God who can do marvelous things. During the early part of her illness she overheard one of the doctors asking what are we going to do with this one?" God gave her a voice and strength to open her eyes to say, "what do you mean by this one? This shocked the doctors and nurses because they had given up on her. Although COVID19, had taken one of her lungs and left her with approximately 80% of the other, Lyn knew God was always with her as she depended on oxygen and she lived on to see four more years. Her constant WhatsApp messages, phone calls, visits from family and church friends, daily devotions and online church worship, she was able to feel connected to her God and others.

On the morning of January 21, 2025 her sunset came and she has now gone home to glory to be with the God she faithfully served.

She leaves to mourn her brothers, Lucas, Elton, Mervin and Winston; sisters: Stacia, Terecia and Amanda.
